#### 14. Direct characterization

- Direct Characterization the author/narrator tells the audience what the personality of the character is.
- "The patient boy and quiet girl were both well mannered and did not disobey their mother."
- What has the narrator told us?

#### Analyze the prompt:

What is the target of Irving's satire in this story? greed, greedy people, marriage

How does Irving go about showing the dark sides of his targets?
Remember that satire uses hyperbole, understatement, irony.
The characters of Tom and his wife are so exaggerated as to be unbelievable (hyperbole)

### Example:

The main object of Irving's satire is greedy people, especially those whose wealth is ill-gotten or gained through the bad luck of others. Irving pokes fun at this type of person through his exaggerated characterization of Tom and his wife. Neither character is believable. The wife is so greedy, she hides eggs from her husband. Tom is not only eager to trade his soul for wealth, but his greed is greater even than the devil's.
